1. Project idea

1.1. India context

With over 1.5 million schools, over 9.7 million teachers and more than 260 million learners, India is home to the largest and most complex education system in the world.¹ In addition, as a multilingual country, India has 22 official languages with a national policy that emphasises the study of at least three languages at school.

In the span of just one year, the number of internet users in India rose by over eight per cent to 624 million in 2021². While the drive to promote education technology precedes Covid-19, the need to rapidly pivot to remote and online teaching has only been accelerated since the pandemic. Various national initiatives such as <u>Digital India</u>, <u>Swayam</u>, and <u>DIKSHA</u> (which has a repository of British Council teacher development resources) have increased in popularity and use, as well as those by private providers.

However, the digital divide in India exists at multiple levels such as urban and rural (rural broadband penetration is only 29 per cent against a national average of 51 per cent) and gender. In 2020, 25 per cent of the total adult female population owned a smartphone versus 41 per cent of adult men. Further, Indian women are 15 per cent less likely to own a mobile phone, and 33 per cent less likely to use mobile internet services than men³.

It is within this varied, diverse and digital-ready context that we propose this grant call.

1.2. Brief for digital innovations in English teaching and learning

We are inviting collaborative applications in response to this open call from organisations across the UK and India. In light of the impact of Covid-19, which has accelerated the digital transformation in education delivery in India, we seek applications which spark innovation, and inspire new ways of working, through a digital-first approach effectively using EdTech for teaching and learning English.

The overall objective is for UK and India organisations to generate new learning and insight through research, design and piloting of digital innovations to ensure equitable, high-quality provision of education technology solutions which address a specific English language need in India.

Further, we encourage new ways of collaborative working between the UK and India, by bringing together the likes of universities, research organisations, English Language Teaching (ELT) suppliers, education publishers, EdTech providers and others. We are particularly interested in collaborations between organisations of differing scales who may not traditionally work together, from both countries.

As this fund is an Overseas Development Assistance (ODA) fund, all innovations must meet the ODA and gender eligibility criteria (see sections 5 and 6 below).

Opportunities may be categorised under three broad themes (N.B. these are not exhaustive lists):

Theme 1: Communities of Practice

This can include Communities of Practice (CoPs) for a specific topic or area (such as Special Educational Needs, assessment, multilingualism etc.) for a specific audience (such as teachers or teacher educators). These can include, for example, CoPs on a bespoke platform or on social media. It is recommended that there are options for teachers for synchronous and asynchronous engagement and via remote, blended and self-access modes. There must be evidence of evaluation of the COP and recommendations for scalability and replicability.

Theme 2: Research

This can include applications for research such as the intersection between technology and areas like Special Educational Needs, assessment, multilingualism etc. Insight that responds to specific questions not yet investigated in India are welcomed. In addition, the inclusion and involvement of early career researchers is encouraged, as is a focus area that influences an aspect of policy or assists in implementing the National Education Policy 2020.

Theme 3: Trials and/or Pilot project implementation

We welcome action-focused responses, which tackle issues of digital equity and access to education, push boundaries and are a catalyst for real change, supporting post Covid-19 recovery. We are interested in ideas that are evidence-based, have longevity and/or the potential to be scaled up or generate learning for India and similar countries. This also refers to platforms or projects that may have been already developed and trialled in other countries as a response to the pandemic and the applicant organisation would like to pilot/trial it in India (contextualising as relevant).

We are committed to equality, diversity and inclusion. This includes taking an inclusive approach to the development of your idea and when considering the audiences you want to reach. We expect to engage with individuals and organisations of different genders, ethnicities, sexualities, abilities and ages either directly through the commission – or indirectly through your project audiences.

We are also committed to UK Government and wider donor 'Principles for Digital Development'

2. Relevance to economic development and social welfare (Official Development Assistance (ODA) eligibility)

For the purpose of this Fund, we define activities leading to impact with development relevance as activities that have the potential to contribute to the economic development and social welfare of India, benefitting low income and/or vulnerable populations.

In order to be considered for funding, all proposals must clearly demonstrate a primary focus on development and articulate a plausible route to positive impact. Applications which do not meet this criterion cannot receive support under the Digital Innovation Fund.

Development relevance can be longer term and less direct than in other areas. In all cases, it is the responsibility of the applicant to articulate within the application how the proposed activities will meet these criteria.

Applicants must complete the ODA compliance section of the application form and should not expect reviewers to make assumptions about development impact that is not clearly described within the proposal.

Failure to demonstrate ODA eligibility will render your application ineligible regardless of other success criteria. Please make sure you consider the ODA relevance of your application. A strong case for your proposal must be made.

In order to show development relevance within the context of their proposed project, applicants are advised to include within their application reference to any local or national consultation, links to government policies, and existing links with government institutions and must clearly articulate the importance to relevant challenges in partner countries.

Agreements for ownership and exploitation of intellectual property generated through project activities must be consistent with the primary aim of addressing development issues.

ODA transparency and reporting

As part of the government's commitment to ODA transparency and in line with FCDO ODA reporting requirements, there is a requirement to publish information about ODA grants including project titles and summaries via the International Aid Transparency Initiative (IATI) registry.

The purpose of publishing information via the IATI registry is to make information about ODA easily accessible to governments, stakeholders and other relevant groups in beneficiary countries. All funded projects from this programme will be published in this way. Please therefore write your project title and summary in such a way that they are meaningful and accessible to non-specialist audiences, following publication.

It is expected that the project title and summary are written in plain English and avoid the use of jargon, acronyms, puns and plays on words. Please also make clear in your project title and summary how your project is ODA-compliant, for example by identifying the development challenge(s) being addressed, the aims of the project and the beneficiary countries.

3. Gender Equality Statement

To comply with the International Development (Gender Equality) Act 2014, applications must outline how they have taken meaningful yet proportionate consideration as to how the project will contribute to reducing gender inequalities in the Gender Equality Statement section of the application form.

Applicants are required to consider the impact their project will have on gender. This should be about the project specifically – the outputs and outcomes; the make-up of the project team; participants,

stakeholders and beneficiaries of the project; and the processes followed. It should not be a re-statement of your Institution's policy, you may refer to the policy, but should show how the policy will be implemented in terms of the project. The Gender Statement must **address the below criteria**, with an understanding that, depending on the nature of project, not all questions will be applicable. If a question is not applicable, you will need to articulate the reasons why.

- Have measures been put in place to ensure equal and meaningful opportunities for people of different genders to be involved throughout the project? This includes the development of the project, the participants, and the beneficiaries.
- The expected impact of the project on people of different genders, both throughout the project.
- The impact on the relations between people of different genders and people of the same gender. For example, changing roles and responsibilities in households, society, economy, politics, power, etc.
- How will any risks and unintended negative consequences on gender equality be avoided or mitigated against, and monitored?
- Are there any relevant outcomes and outputs being measured, with data disaggregated by age and gender (where disclosed)?

The British Council reserve the right to reject the application if no consideration has been given to gender equality or if the proposal is assessed to result in a negative impact for gender equality.

4. Eligibility for digital innovations

This 'Digital Learning Innovation Fund' is designed to support collaborations between the UK and India.

- We are inviting applications for innovative responses to this open call. Applications must include at least one partner in the UK and one from India. Applicants must be living in their respective country at the time of applying and for the duration of this project.
- Applicants can apply for between £20,000 to £25,000 (all inclusive) to realise their innovative idea, up to a maximum value of £25,000 per project. Applicants with in kind or matched support are welcome, although this is not essential. Match funding cannot be provided through other British Council funded programmes.
- Applications should be jointly submitted and signed by all named collaborators, with one principal
 applicant e.g., a lead UK partner organisation, who will be contracted and responsible for leading
 communications and disseminating the grant to all collaborators.
- Organisations and/or informal collectives/networks are eligible to apply but should have demonstrable experience of managing similar projects and grants.

- Applicants must be able to demonstrate clear benefit to India and meet the ODA and gender criteria above, which should be reflected through the project planning (including budget allocation), delivery and dissemination. This includes demonstrating how the local partners or their audiences may benefit. Mutuality must be a central component to the international collaboration.
- We expect applications to embed principles of equality, diversity and inclusion through their core
 proposal and idea (including costs relating to captioning videos or translating content).
- We are interested in new, original ideas in response to this brief. Existing projects and programmes
 will be ineligible. Exceptions apply for existing ideas which have reached a pilot or prototyping phase
 but have not been realised publicly.
- Applicants will be expected to plan, design, and realise their project from 16 August 2022 with the main activity complete by 31 January 2023. The main activity can take place any time during the year, although we anticipate that you will respect the annual academic calendar (and holiday breaks) in India. Expected outputs include: a report on the project, a presentation (and/or webinar) summarising key activities, learning and recommendations and, if applicable, information on licensing and other technical requirements.
- If relevant to their project idea, applicants must ensure their idea is compatible with platforms
 available in India, and must provide details on how this will be realised given the India context and
 confirm that they will put relevant agreements in place with host organisations, online sites, media
 partners etc.
- Successful applicants will own the copyright of any work created but must grant the British Council,
 as the commissioning partners, free and unequivocal use of any arising outputs, which may include
 promotion of works through our digital channels or exhibiting works in the future. For the avoidance
 of doubt, this license will not include use of any work for commercial purposes.
- Successful applicants will be required to keep in regular communication with the British Council,
 offering project updates and share their project monitoring and evaluation progress and final reports
 for review and publication.

5. Selection process and criteria

Applications will be reviewed by a panel from the British Council. Our assessment of successful applicants will be based on the following criteria:

- Innovation the quality and innovative nature of the idea and approach, alignment to the evidence base around what we know works, especially in EdTech and innovation, and ability to solve a specific challenge or need within the India education system (30%)
- **Collaboration** the partners involved and the nature of the collaboration, with a particular emphasis on the level of mutuality within the partnership (20%)

- Impact the potential impact this innovation will have on the partners and audiences involved
 including ability to meet ODA and gender criteria, as well as potential for additional learning, scaling
 up or further development beyond the scope of this innovation (20%)
- Quality the experience of the applicants in delivering high quality work (15%)
- Budget the extent to which costings are appropriately calculated, reflect good value for money, are relevant to the proposed approach and are distributed amongst partners (15%)

The panel, comprising representatives from the British Council, will consider all applicants to ensure a diverse selection are supported. This will include achieving a geographical spread across the UK and India, the type and format of the response.

Applicants may be approached with clarification questions or to attend an interview with the panel. Applicants must be available to respond and/or attend an interview if required (conducted digitally) in line with the schedule below.
