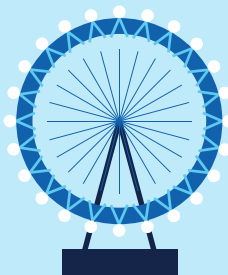

Undergraduate studies

For international undergraduates looking to kick-start their career, the UK offers far more than just a world-class education. With a wide range of learning experiences around every corner, you will graduate with the confidence, skills and knowledge to shape your future.

UK undergraduate course types include:

- **Bachelor's or undergraduate degree:** BA (Bachelor of Arts), BSc (Bachelor of Science), BEd (Bachelor of Education) and BEng (Bachelor of Engineering). A full-time bachelor's degree normally takes three years to complete (four in some cases). Part-time options are also available at some universities and colleges.
- **Shorter courses:** Foundation Degree, Diploma of Higher Education, Higher National Diploma, and Certificate of Higher Education.

Postgraduate studies

With our exceptional academic standards, progressive teaching techniques and globally respected research practices, it's easy to see why so many international postgraduates choose to study in the UK.

Some UK postgraduate course types include:

Master's degrees

- M.A (Master's of Arts)
- M.Sc (Master's of Science)
- M.Eng (Master's of Engineering)
- M.FA (Master's of Fine Arts)
- LL.M (Master's of Law)
- M.Arch (Master's of Architecture)
- M.Phil (Master's of Philosophy)
- MBA (Master's of Business Administration)

Subject specific qualifications are research-led and usually designed for students to progress to a PhD.

A full-time master's degree normally takes one year (taught master's) or two years (research master's) to complete. Part-time options are also available at some universities.



PhDs or doctorates

Postgraduate diplomas and qualifications: are usually shorter than a master's courses and do not involve a theses and dissertations.

Other study options

As well as undergraduate and postgraduate study, the UK offers many other education opportunities for international students:

Further education refers to education after secondary school that is not an undergraduate or postgraduate course. Further education institutions in the UK provide technical and professional education and training to people over the age of 16. Qualifications and training include A-Levels, apprenticeships, traineeships, vocational qualifications and entry level training.

Foundation pathway courses are designed for international students to improve their English skills and develop the confidence to start undergraduate or postgraduate study. They provide the opportunity to adjust to the UK's culture and get used to university teaching.

English language courses: As the home of the English language and reputation for academic excellence, the UK is the perfect place to learn English.

Apply for undergraduate studies

Most undergraduate applications are made through the Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS). To apply through UCAS, go to www.ucas.com to register your details in their system. You can apply for up to five courses through UCAS and you will be contacted with any offers by your chosen universities or colleges.

Application deadlines

Stay informed and check the UCAS website regularly for the latest dates and deadlines. Clearing usually opens in the first week of July, with vacancies listed in their search tool, and typically closes by the third week of October.

What is Clearing?

Clearing is how universities and colleges in the UK fill any places they still have on their courses.

Clearing opens on 5 July 2025. Vacancies are displayed in the UCAS search tool and the process will close on 21 October 2025.

You can apply for a course using the clearing process if you're not already holding an offer from a university or college, and the course still available.

You can use Clearing if:

- You're applying after 30 June.
- You didn't receive any offers (or none you wanted to accept).
- You didn't meet the conditions of their offers.
- You've paid the multiple choice application fee.
- You've declined your firm place using the 'decline my place' button in your application.

Useful tips for applying through Clearing:

- Ask for advice from your teachers and counsellors.
- See what courses are available by using the search tool on UCAS and check entry requirements.
- Consider different courses of subjects.
- Directly contact universities or colleges you're interested in.
- Add your Clearing choice in your application.

Apply for postgraduate studies

Many UK universities handle their own postgraduate applications and you can often apply directly through their websites.

Many postgraduate courses do not have fixed application deadlines. However, it is always best to apply early to make sure you have the best chance of being accepted – ideally, six months to a year before your course of choice begins.

What you will need when applying to UK universities and colleges

Your qualifications

Check how your country's qualifications compare to those in the UK. Scan the QR code to access and contact the National Recognition Information Centre.



Personal statement

You will be required to provide a personal statement as part of your application to study at a UK university. This document is your opportunity to explain why you would like to study your chosen subject, and to outline the skills and experience that make you well suited to this field.

Here are some tips:

- The course description on the university website will explain the qualities, skills and experience it requires. Be sure to explain how you match each of these requirements as you write your statement.
- State why you are applying for the course. Be specific about which aspects interest you most, and how you believe the course will help you in your future ambitions.
- As well as explaining why you are academically suited to the course, also describe any work experience you may have – or any extra curricular activities you take part in.

Additional documents and information

While UCAS can send results on your behalf (including the International Baccalaureate) for most international qualifications, you may need to send proof of those results yourself.

You should check with your chosen university, to understand what their policy is on the additional documents and information. You may be required to provide proof in the form of certificates or transcripts.



Student visas

Most international students will need a visa to study in the UK. Finding out whether you need a visa to study is easy – simply [check the UK government's website using the QR.](#)



Student visa (previously Tier 4 visa)

If you are 16 or over and want to study a course at higher education level in the UK lasting longer than six months, you will most likely need to apply for a student visa through the Student Route.

This costs £524 per applicant. If you want a priority or super-priority service, it will cost more.

Please note: from January 2025 onwards, you must register with UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) and apply for an eVisa. See more guidance in the FAQs section below.

eVisa

An eVisa is a digital record that confirms your immigration status and the conditions under which you are allowed to enter or remain in the UK. To access your eVisa, you will need to create a UKVI account. Switching from a physical document to an eVisa does not alter your immigration status or the terms of your permission to enter or stay in the UK.

From 15 July 2025, you may not get a vignette if you apply for a study visa (including short-term up to 11 months).

Instead, you will need to create a UKVI account and access your eVisa before you travel. You'll be told what to do when you apply. Dependants and children will still get both a vignette (sticker) and an eVisa.

You should create your UKVI account and access your eVisa before you travel to the UK to avoid any issues when travelling.

What you will need to apply

When you apply for your Student visa you must provide:

- A current passport or other valid travel documentation
- A Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS) from your course provider.

You may be asked for additional documentation too depending on the country you're applying for, and circumstances.

How to apply

When you can apply depends on whether you're applying from inside or outside the UK.

Applying from outside the UK

The earliest you can apply for a visa is 6 months before you start your course.

You'll usually get a decision on your visa within 3 weeks.

Applying from inside the UK

The earliest you can apply is 3 months before your course starts.

You must apply before your current visa expires. Your new course must begin within 28 days of your current visa expiring.

You'll usually get a decision within 8 weeks.

You are recommended to prepare and apply for your visa well in advance. You can make an application up to six months before you intend to travel. If you need a visa quickly, you can pay extra for a priority service.

Apply to stay and work in the UK after graduating

Graduate route

The UK's Graduate route welcomes international students to apply to stay in the UK and work, or look for work, upon graduation. International students who have successfully completed an undergraduate or master's degree can apply to stay in the UK for up to two years after their studies. PhD graduates can apply to stay for up to three years.

Money, budgeting and scholarships

Course fees

Fees for UK courses vary depending on your study level and where in the UK you are studying (as there are different rules for England, Scotland, Northern Ireland and Wales).

International students can expect to pay between £11,400 and £38,000 annually for tuition, with undergraduate degrees typically lasting four years in Scotland and three years in the rest of the UK.

Always be sure to check the cost of course fees with the university or college you are applying to. Most often, this information will be listed the universities' websites.



Living costs

The cost of living varies, according to where in the UK you decide to study. London and other big cities are more expensive than other areas, for example. But depending on your location, you should budget between £1,300 and £1,400 per month for living costs in London, and between £900 and £1,300 per month for other parts of the UK, covering rent, bills, entertainment, and other expenses.

Scholarships and financial support

There are hundreds of scholarships, bursaries and grant schemes on offer for students who need extra support to pay for their UK course. Many institutions offer their own scholarships and bursaries. Check the universities' websites for more information.

GREAT scholarships

GREAT scholarships are for international students who want to study at a UK university for a one-year postgraduate course. Each scholarship offers a minimum of £10,000 towards tuition fees.

The scholarships are jointly funded by the British Council, the GREAT Britain Campaign, and participating UK higher education institutions.

Living in the UK

University-owned accommodation

Most universities and colleges have their own accommodation office, and this should be the first place you go to ask about accommodation. Most institutions provide accommodation for international students in a hall of residence (either full-board or self-catering) or a self-catering shared house or flat. Space is usually limited, so applications for such accommodation should be made as soon as you have been accepted on your course and certainly before the required deadlines.

Private accommodation

The accommodation office at your institution should be able to help with this, too. The office may keep lists of private accommodation available in the area, and some offices may even help you arrange a booking. Do check in with them for more information.

The most common type of private accommodation is a room in a house with shared facilities. Renting a furnished house or a flat is likely to be expensive, especially in city centres, and can be quite difficult to secure. A good way of making this affordable is to share with other students. If you do this, make sure you agree beforehand on how you will share costs.

Food is often near the top of the list of things we miss when away from home. But food can be one of the best parts of living in the UK. Your time at university offers you a great opportunity to build a positive relationship with food and cooking, to create some interesting, delicious meals and to really enjoy yourself.

On average, a month's food expenses amount to about £155 in London and £116 in the rest of the UK. You'll find a range of supermarkets offering plenty of options to accommodate different student budgets.

An increasing number of UK supermarkets offer international food products, so you will always be able to get together with friends and cook the food you love. By living among people from all backgrounds and cultures, you can also try out new and different cuisines. So why not ask your flat mates for a few tips, and learn to make some quick and easy dishes from different cultures?

Living in catered halls at university typically includes breakfast and dinner from Monday to Friday, with at least some meals provided during the weekend as well, since cooking facilities are often limited. It's advisable to check with your specific accommodation for details.



Leisure time

On campus, the students' union organizes social functions, and there are numerous clubs and societies to join. The UK is rich in arts and culture, with museums, theatres, and attractions to explore.

The restaurant scene is diverse, and pubs are popular social spots where you can enjoy non-alcoholic drinks and activities like karaoke, football match screenings, and pub quizzes.

The UK hosts major music venues and events, including the O2 Arena and Glastonbury Festival. Many universities also feature live music and small venues, and most towns have cinemas showing both mainstream and independent films, often at student-friendly prices.

For sports enthusiasts, the UK offers a range of options to pursue your passion. With a strong sports culture and top athletes, you can engage in various sports, from global team games to individual competitions, alongside your studies.



UK weather and clothing

UK weather is unpredictable but rarely extreme. Be sure to check the weather and temperature ranges in the areas you're considering moving to, as the climate can vary widely across the UK. Dress in layers to adjust to changing conditions, and always carry an umbrella.

UK towns and cities offer a wide range of clothing shops to suit all styles and budgets. Students typically dress casually during the day, with jeans and t-shirts being common, and more formally for evenings out.

Some courses require specialist clothing for safety, such as lab coats and protective glasses, which may be provided by the university or need to be purchased.

The UK's multicultural environment means you'll see a variety of cultural and religious attire, including headscarves, kippahs, turbans, saris, and more. Major cities have specialist shops offering diverse clothing options, particularly Asian and Middle Eastern styles.



Four seasons in the UK

There are various ways to query the weather in the UK. Smartphones come with their own weather query tools. Two authoritative UK weather forecast networks recommended are the Met Office and BBC Weather.



Spring

Spring usually begins at the vernal equinox, around March 20 in the northern hemisphere. The weather in Britain is slightly dry in spring.



Summer

The British summer calendar includes three months in June, July and August, from the day of the summer solstice around June 21. It is also the longest day of the year.



Autumn

Autumn in the UK starts around the autumnal equinox on September 22 and lasts until November. The season is characterized by increasingly cooler temperatures, especially noticeable in the mornings and evenings. As autumn progresses, the weather becomes more unpredictable, with frequent rain and wind in the latter half of the season.



Winter

Winter begins at the winter solstice, around December 22 in the Northern Hemisphere. The winter solstice marks the shortest day of the year, after which the days start to lengthen.

Explore the UK

From bustling cities to snow-capped mountains, rolling green hills to highlands and islands, exploring is a must. Its relatively small size and good transport links mean that you can see a lot while you are here. Some highlights include London with its fascinating history, iconic buildings, cutting-edge fashion, theatre and food; northern cities like Manchester and Liverpool, which are well known for their famous football clubs and great nightlife; Scotland's stunning mix of wild beauty and buzzing cities; the stunning landscapes of Wales' national parks; and the spectacular coastline of Northern Ireland.

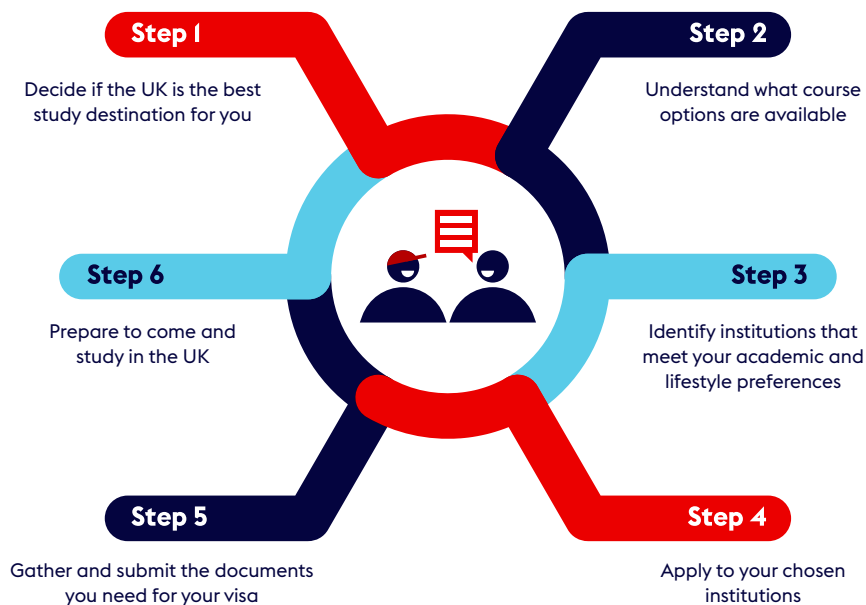


A student guide to choosing an education agent

Do the agent offices/staff seem professional and friendly?	✓
Is the education agent listed on the British Council website: https://www.britishcouncil.org/education/agents-counsellors/database	✓
If you know where you want to apply, is the education agent listed as an official representative or partner on the school/college/university website?	✓
What are other students saying about the education agent on social media? Note: Even the best agent can't make everybody happy but this will help you decide if they are right for you.	✓

Here are some questions to ask that will help you select a good education agent:

Questions	What you should expect from the education agent
Can you tell me about the education opportunities offered in the UK?	A well trained agent will explain the UK education system, the different regions of the UK and the schools/colleges/universities they represent. They should give you a good understanding of the many options open to you in the UK.
Do you comply with the UK's National Code of Ethical Practice for UK Education Agents?	They should know what the National Code is and show you a copy. Familiarise yourself with the National Code to see how your education agent is doing.
Are you paid a commission by the schools/colleges/universities that you promote?	Most schools/colleges/universities pay a commission for the agent to represent them, and this covers the agent's operating costs, so the answer will usually be 'yes'. Regardless of whether the agent is paid a commission or not, they should give you high-quality and unbiased advice.
Do you charge any fees? Please can you provide me with a list of all potential fees, what they are for, and when they are expected?	Agent fees are typically covered by the school/college/university, but education agents may charge fees for some additional services. They should be clear with you at the start of the process if they will charge you any fees and what they are for. If you are unsure you may check with the institutions that you plan to apply to.
Are you licensed to act as an education agent?	The UK does not require a licence for agents to recruit students to UK universities, colleges or schools but agents operating in your country may require a local licence. Do your research beforehand to find out if this applies in your own country. This may include checking with your government's education department or on the British Council's website.
Are you a licensed UK immigration advisor?	There are many good education agents that are not licensed UK immigration advisors. They are still experts that can help you with your student visa application. It is important that you receive clear and accurate advice as the wrong immigration advice could have serious consequences. In the UK licensed advisors will be registered with the OISC or the Law society. Check with government sources in your own country and beware of trusting unverified information such as online forums.
When did you last receive training on UK visa regulations?	Good education agents will regularly attend training by their partner institutions, the British Council, and UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI). Can I speak to a former student of yours who is currently studying in the UK?	Most education agents keep in touch with the students they place. Speaking to them can be a useful way to find out about their experiences.
Will you offer me any additional support after I arrive in the UK?	Some education agents offer additional help after you arrive in the UK, e.g. providing visa updates, accommodation support, etc.

Remember, where and what you study is your decision.

Education agents are there to help you make an informed decision. Not to decide for you. Be open to any ideas they may suggest but remain firm about what you want. If you believe that you are not receiving the best service, contact the institutions you are applying to. Seek suggestions for an alternative education agent and get them to investigate your complaint. Similarly, if you have had a good experience support other students by recommending them and providing reviews.



If your education agent offers to hold money, apply for or offer loans or make fee payments on your behalf, please check with your chosen institution if this is legitimate.

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
