

UNESCO's definition

"Recognition is a formal acknowledgement by a competent recognition authority regarding the validity and academic level of a foreign education qualification, of partial studies or prior learning"

'A Practical Guide to Recognition', UNESCO, 2020



So, what exactly is 'recognition'?

- 'Recognition' is a formal acknowledgement by a competent authority of the <u>standard</u> and <u>standing</u> of a qualification
- More important than ever
 - More than 5 million students worldwide enrolled in HE outside of their home countries
 - Number expected to double over 10 years



Why is recognition important?

- Benefits:
 - Facilitates international mobility
 - Supports recruitment for work/study
 - Increases transparency and trust
 - Raises quality standards
 - Aids internationalisation efforts



An 'outcomes-based' approach

- 'Learning outcomes' describe what an individual should reasonably be able to know, do and/or understand upon successful completion of the programme of study
- Learning outcomes may be generic or subject-specific
- There are different ways in which learning outcomes may be expressed



Factors informing learning outcomes

- National qualification status
 Assessment methods
- Level of the qualification in its home context
- Entry requirements
- **Duration**
- Structure and content
- Mode of delivery
- Teaching and learning methods


- Progression routes
- Professional rights/licensing




An 'outcomes-based' approach

- Our outcomes-based methodology has been established for 25 years
- This evaluation methodology can be applied to any types of qualification
- It can support the development of (new) qualifications, education provisions and frameworks









Ensuring good practice

- An outcomes-based approach to recognition can help inform:
 - Qualification benchmarking
 - Qualification design and development
 - Raising of standards
 - Mobility and transferability
 - Establishment of education partnerships
- ...and all sorts of other useful activities



Our work on 'mutual recognition'

- Successful track-record in leading technical discussions around mutual recognition
- Formal 'Mutual Recognition Agreements' (MRAs) can support national objectives in education and trade
- MoU facilitating India-UK cooperation on the mutual recognition of academic qualifications was signed in July 2022 – intended to pave the way for a full UK-India MRA
- Ecctis-UK ENIC currently working with AIU and BC colleagues to support UK-India collaboration and exchange



Latest developments

- UK-India MoU on mutual recognition signed in July 2022
- AIU-British Council delegation visit to the UK in June 2023:
 - Various meetings and workshops at Ecctis, including hybrid roundtable discussion featuring 30 UK universities
 - Various site-visits
- Working Group established to facilitate information- and knowledge-sharing, and to drive action
- Programme of workshops and seminars before the end of year



Looking ahead

- Further engagements planned
- Ecctis-UK ENIC has been developing a new methodology to measure, quantify and translate credit
 - Intended to support the recognition of:
 - incomplete and/or partially documented awards
 - small units of learning (e.g. short courses and microcredentials)
 - 360 UK ENIC credits = 1 academic year / 2 semesters of full-time study



Ecctis-UK ENIC support:

- Membership
- Benchmarking and qualifications review
- Quality and standards development
- International partnerships:
 - Learning outcomes
 - Alignment of outcomes, teaching and learning, and assessment
 - Credit systems (credit size, credit value)
