

Best of British contemporary art on India tour from January

KOLKATA: Showcasing the best of art being produced by leading contemporary artists in Britain, an upcoming four-city art exhibition in India will grapple with the relationship between self and place in a world of transitory identities and contested geographies.

Culled from the art collection of British Council, the exhibition 'Homelands' which will travel to New Delhi, Kolkata, Bangalore and Mumbai from January is a unique take on contemporary British art by Indian curator Latika Gupta.

Including more than 80 works by 28 leading modern and contemporary artists, 'Homelands' excavates the idea of a 'homeland' to reveal a rich plurality of meaning; ideas of belonging, alienation, history and memory.

The collection includes works by four Turner Prize winners - Jeremy Deller, Richard Long, Grayson Perry and Gillian Wearing.

Four of the showcased artists are being invited to visit the exhibition in India, including Mona Hatoum, Suki Dhanda and Zineb Sedira. During their stay, the artists will engage with audiences, through seminars, curator-led walks, outreach activities and workshops.

Curator Latika Gupta says the collection raises questions like what constitutes a homeland - ethnicity, language, religion, customs or beliefs.

"Today, many of us move across national boundaries. We are born in one country, we make another our home. In the criss-crossing of political, social and cultural borders, we live our lives through hyphenated identities: belonging here and there; inhabiting multiple places - both physical and metaphorical," she says.

Rob Lynes, Director, British Council India, says, "It asks such fundamental questions about a world that's changing in front of our eyes, about the sometimes bewildering identity crisis that, for so many of us, constitutes modern life. 'Homelands' demonstrates that art can help us learn about the world around us: but also, that it can help us learn about ourselves".



MONA HATOUM VISIT

Public talk: Sat 2 Feb

Mona held a 90 minute talk about her work and practice followed by a Q&A session.

170 people attended, including leading artists, art critics, educators and editors from India and abroad - as well as students and members of the public.

GALLERY TOURS: SCHOLAR GUIDES

Free drop-in tours: daily

'Drop-in' tours led by scholar guides are available to any member of the public visiting the exhibition. These guides are young people from the National Museum, who are part of the IGNCA scholar guide programme, led by Mr. Achal Pandya, Head of Department (Cultural Archives and Conservation), and Associate Professor (Museology and Conservation).

As part of their learning process, the guides participated in a workshop with Latika Gupta to understand the Homelands exhibition, its works and theme. They are now imparting this knowledge to visitors.

The guides take half day shifts at the gallery space, approaching people who enter to let them know they are available to answer any questions on the work, or to give a short tour of the exhibition.
