OUR WORK IN ENGLISH FOR EDUCATION SYSTEMS

Primary

MAHARASHTRA: TEJAS

- A partnership project with Govt. of Maharashtra and Tata Trusts
- Teachers form face-to-face and digital communities of practice through Teacher Activity Groups (TAGs) in their local areas.
- Focuses on a collaborative approach enabled by digital support.
- TAGs enable teachers to develop their language and teaching skills, knowledge and experience.

95% Teachers try out new ideas from TAG in their lessons each month	84% Teachers find their TAG WhatsApp group useful	95% Teachers feel their English has improved since joining their TAG
93% Teachers feel their learners are making progress in their English	95% Teachers like to share their experiences and ideas about teaching during the TAG meeting	89% TAG Coordinators use English appropriately during the TAG meeting





INDIA: CONTEXT

India, with over **1.5 million schools**, over **8.7 million primary and secondary teachers** and more than **260 million enrolments**, is home to the **largest and most complex education system in the world**.

By 2030, India will be amongst the **youngest nations in the world** with 54 per cent of the population being under 25.

Less than 3% of India's employable workforce have undergone formal skills training (compared to 68% in the UK) Only 45% of grade eight students read English Hourly wages are on average 34% higher for who speak good English and 13% higher for those with some English skills Shortage of skilled and trained faculty and limited professional development opportunities in higher education sector

Limited opportunities for students to practice innovation, problem solving and creativity in STEM

India adds 12 million people to its workforce every year with 711 million people currently within the working age group of 18-59 years

INDIA: PRIORITIES AND INITIATIVES



2019 draft **National Education Policy** - an ongoing commitment to quality provision – strong focus on teacher continuing professional development

Skill India aims to skill over 500m youth by 2022

Education Quality Upgradation and Inclusion Programme (EQUIP), five-year plan (2019-24) suggests 50+ initiatives for transforming higher education

Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan and Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education focus on access, inclusivity and quality

DIKSHA and SWAYAM as part of the 'Digital India' campaign - online platforms for teachers and students.

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INDIA: CHALLENGES

- Size and scale of educational ecosystem
- Governance/Central Vs State, Public Vs Private
- High dropout: 2.2 million exit at the senior secondary transition point
- Vocational education: not aspirational, lack of pathways between VET and mainstream education, lack of industry engagement
- Teachers: availability, deployment and quality
- Digital solutions: accessibility and infrastructure
- High availability of free content on streaming sites and other digital channels: questions remain around quality


WORKING WITH THE UK
