- Mid utterance corrections and backtracking
- Use of discourse markers to express interest, surprise etc.

Strategies for speaking

Social / professional contexts

- Be familiar with the context
- Ask questions
- Rephrase
- Paraphrase
- Don't worry about mistakes

In the classroom

- Script the instructions you will use
- Rehearse stories you will tell

Pronunciation

Key aspects for speaking

- Intonation and rhythm
 - Word stress
 - Sentence stress
 - Rising and falling tones
- Connected speech
 - Consonant-vowel linking
 - Vowel-vowel linking
 - Schwa and weak words

Part 3: Practising English

Build your toolkit: Practise on your own

- Listen to lots of authentic English
- Notice aspects of pronunciation
 - Count the number of words in short sentences
 - Notice words being 'pushed together'
 - Notice sounds which don't match spellings
- Repeat and practise saying sentences. Record yourself!
 - Listen to your recording and compare to the original
 - Notice the good things and the things to improve ③

Build your toolkit: Practise with a friend

Play games on WhatsApp or other social media

Classroom instructions

Pick an activity that you and your colleague often do in the classroom. Both prepare instructions. Record them and compare them.

Dialogue build up

One person starts the game by sending a photograph. It could be a photo you have taken or one from the internet. Build a conversation around the photo.

• Describe a lesson or recent experience

One person describes an experience and the other one replies with questions asking for more information.

Build your toolkit: Practise with a group of colleagues

Use Zoom or other videoconferencing software to meet with your colleagues and practise English. Here are some ideas. Mix them up to create an interesting agenda:

- Have a 'Show and Tell' meeting
- Play the 'Just a minute' game
- Debate and discuss
- Share a successful recipe
- Share successful lesson ideas
- Discuss how to deal with different teaching situations

Summary: What you need

Awareness and noticing

- Listen widely. Listen to different accents. Listen to different types of audio.
- Notice aspects of pronunciation. Notice how sounds change and which words are stressed.
- Notice aspects of formal, neutral and informal language. Which words do friends use? Notice which words politicians use.
- Compare a written news article with a presenter talking about the topic. What is the difference in sentence structure?

Practise

- Practise on your own by listening, repeating and recording yourself.
 Compare yourself to the original. Focus on one thing to improve each time.
- **Practise with a friend** using WhatsApp recordings. Make up games, notice each other's areas for improvements.
- Practise with a group of friends or colleagues and create fun and interesting meeting agendas. Share lifehacks and recipes.


- 1. My colleague Lakshmi and I will practise classroom instructions on WhatsApp on Tuesdays and have a conversation based on photographs on Thursdays
