Knowing how to promote your blog to new readers


• Uploading photos on social media platforms

Knowing when to restrict privacy


• Posting responses to comments, blogs and emails








Why should you include digital literacies in the classroom?

- Literacy extends beyond the language classroom similarly digital literacy needs should not be restricted to the IT class.
- Communication is increasingly digitally mediated and as teachers we should promote the skills students need to succeed along with English language skills.
- Encourages critical thinking and problem solving.
- Students can learn to express themselves beyond the classroom.

Digital literacies are the essential skills our students need to acquire for full participation in the world beyond the classroom, but they can also enrich our students learning inside the classroom.



THE PACIFIC NORTHWEST TREE OCTOPUS

The Pacific Northwest tree octopus (*Octopus paxarbolis*) can be found in the **temperate rainforests** of the Olympic Peninsula on the west coast of North America. Their habitat lies on the Eastern side of the Olympic mountain range, adjacent to Hood Canal. These solitary cephalopods reach an average size (measured from arm-tip to mantle-tip,) of 30-33 cm. Unlike most other cephalopods, tree octopuses are amphibious, spending only their early life and the period of their mating season in their ancestral aquatic environment. Because of the moistness of the rainforests and specialized skin adaptations, they are able to keep from becoming desiccated for prolonged periods of time, but given the chance they would prefer resting in pooled water.

An intelligent and inquisitive being (it has the largest brainto-body ratio for any mollusk), the tree octopus explores its arboreal world by both touch and sight. Adaptations its ancestors originally evolved in the three dimensional environment of the sea have been put to good use in the spatially complex maze of the **coniferous Olympic rainforests**. The challenges and richness of this

environment (and the intimate way in which it interacts with it,) may account for the tree octopus's advanced behavioral development. (Some evolutionary theorists suppose that "arboreal adaptation" is what laid the groundwork in primates for the evolution of the human mind.)

Evaluating information online

What makes the website look authentic?

- Source of the information uses a .net URL
- Lots of content with hyperlinks
- Use of images
- Links with the creator's profile and email ID

How do we know it isn't?

- The URL is suspicious
- The content is not credible
- Images are photoshopped
- No 'About Us' section
- The creator's profile is suspicious!

Evaluating information online

Where does the information come from?

When was it posted online?

Who created the information?

What does the website look like?

How do we verify the content?

Suggested activity

Stage 1: brief discussion on news and fake news

Stage 2: read two webpages and find specific information on characteristics, habitat, history

Stage 3: Teacher explains one of the two websites is a fake! Encourages student groups to use the five questions to check validity

Tips for successful integration of digital literacies

- Need for variety incorporating different digital literacies using a range of tools
- Regular inclusion of digital literacies throughout a course/syllabus with objectives that are clear to learners
- Upskill yourselves

If you want to keep up, don't try to keep up with the technologies. Keep up with the literacies that the technologies make possible.


